- WHEREAS, the average age of the approximately 118,000 practicing family physicians in the United States is
- 2 reported to be 55 to 58, and in 2023, 4,530 medical students matched to family medicine, and
- 3 **WHEREAS**, if these older physicians retire in 10 years, approximately 60,000 family physicians (6,000 per year) will
- 4 be needed to be trained to replace them, and
- 5 **WHEREAS**, data shows that medical students choose their specialty in their second or third year of medical school,
- 6 with their decision based on salary data from 6-7 years before they can start practicing, and
- 7 **WHEREAS**, family physicians and other primary care physicians consume only about 5%-6% of overall healthcare
- 8 expenditures, and approximately just one-third of that goes into the net pay of these primary care physicians, and
- 9 WHEREAS, family physicians and other primary care physicians could have their net pay doubled with less than a
- 10 2% increase in overall healthcare expenditures, and
- 11 WHEREAS, value-based payments raise some family medicine physicians' pay but decrease some family medicine
- physicians' pay, now, therefore, be it
- 13 **RESOLVED**, that Michigan Academy of Family Physicians use resources to encourage health plans lawmakers, and
- policymakers to commit to a near-immediate substantial pay increase of at least 30%, and more in shortage areas,
- with ongoing substantial increases for fee-for-service and capitation pay for family medicine physicians; and be it

- 17 **RESOLVED**, that Michigan Academy of Family Physicians educate health plans and those in government that for
- 18 every year action isn't taken, fewer and fewer family physicians and primary care physicians practice in the United
- 19 States and Michigan; and be it further
- 20 **RESOLVED**, that Michigan Academy of Family Physicians ask the American Academy of Family Physicians to use
- 21 substantial resources to encourage Medicare, Medicaid, and all other federal government-supported health plans to
- 22 commit to a near immediate substantial pay increase of at least 30%, and more in shortage areas, with ongoing
- 23 substantial increases for both fee-for-service and capitation pay for family medicine physicians; and be it further
- 24 **RESOLVED**, that Michigan Academy of Family Physicians ask the American Academy of Family Physicians to take
- 25 substantial efforts and resources to educate health plans and those in government that every year that if action isn't
- taken fewer and fewer family physicians and primary care physicians practice will exist in the United States.
